# Our Purpose

The Purposes of the American Iris Society, and Region 4, shall be to develop the science of horticulture and any activities related to the study, propagation and culture of the genus Iris; to stimulate and foster interest in horticultural pursuits, conservation and protection of these plants; to cooperate with other organizations, public and private, in the scientific and horticultural education of all those interested in learning any phase of the genus Iris, by any and all means which may be determined from time to time by the Board of Directors. These shall include but are not limited to:

- (a) encouragement and support of scientific research, including those pertaining to the solution of diseases related to but not necessarily exclusive to the genus Iris, and investigation and conservation of the genus in the wild;
- (b) collection, compilation and publication of data concerning the history, classification, breeding and culture of Irises; and
- (c) education of the public through exhibitions, public display gardens, published standards for judging and local, area, regional and national meetings open to the public.

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# RVP'S MESSAGE

Winter has us in its grip and one need not feel guilty at taking time for paperwork as the rains/snows come down. Despite the blustery weather, we have had 3 different unguicularis in constant bloom since November. What a delight it is to pick something fresh and live on a cold dreary winter day. I

heartily recommend these winter-blooming irises for their ease of growth and cold weather bloom.

Region 4 membership continues to grow. The latest list from AIS shows us at 715, an all time high. The flip side of all this is that the names of 145 members will be dropped on March 1st. Rich Randall and I discussed this during a recent visit and we were both at a loss to come up with any strategies to stem the tide of non-renewals. I hope that individual clubs will continue to press for renewal among the delinquent members in their group.

The annual Affiliation paperwork has been completed and all 13 societies elected to complete the process. One of the prime requirements for affiliation is that all elected club officials must be AIS members in good standing. There were several instances where this was not the case and much time was spent in trying to correct these omissions. Thank goodness for email so that I could check directly with Marilyn Harlow and local membership chairpersons for last minute renewals. I am very pleased to note that the Blue Ridge group has reorganized and again become an active chapter.

In February you received your January AIS Bulletin. Do carefully read pages 64 and 65 and note the changes in Exhibition procedures. Show schedules should be sent to Mike Moller; show supplies will be ordered from Barbara Figge and final show reports will be sent to Maxine Perkins. Addresses will be supplied when your schedule is approved. This division of labor is on trial basis for one year and I suggest that you keep close tabs on when you send in your paperwork as well as when you receive a reply. In Austin, Mike emphasized that the 60 days-before-show-date rule for schedule submission must be observed so that the schedules can be approved in timely fashion.

Do not hesitate to notify me or any other director if you experience problems in any area of the exhibition procedure.

Region 4 has lost several dedicated and outstanding irisarians during the past 6 months. BJ and Frances Brown, who were old and dear friends to many of us and who did much for the region in so many ways, were killed in an auto accident last fall. On February 14, Rich Randall's courageous battle with cancer came to an end. My tribute to Rich appears elsewhere in this issue. We ask your prayers for both families as they work their way through the grieving process.

I think often of you who are dealing with high water and many inches of snow. However, the February jasmine and japonica are in bloom, the days are appreciably longer, I picked the first daffodils today, and I heard the first peepers (frogs) last night. Spring must be on its way!

I look forward to a good turn-out at the Spring Regional in Maryland and I hope to see you there.



# Rich Randall The Man, The Irisarian, The Friend

Early in the morning on February 14th, Rich Randall gave up his year long battle with cancer. The iris world has lost an energetic advocate, Region 4 has lost an outstanding membership chairman, and many of us have lost a valued friend. He will be missed.

In a few short years Rich became well known within the iris community. He believed in AIS and was firmly convinced that local iris societies were the way to attract people to the growing and promoting of irises. He was instrumental in getting several regional



iris clubs started and was a charter member of at least 4 of them. His continuous recruiting efforts made him one of the top regional membership directors in AIS. He developed a regional membership contest program through which Region 4 continuously captures a number of national membership awards each year. He was a discriminating but absolutely fair judge of both bearded and beardless irises. Rich encountered more than his share of problems associated with growing irises in coastal Virginia, and he was more than willing to share his experiences or listen to advice from other irisarians. He attended conventions of all kinds and was always ready to hit the road to see a garden. He was responsible for designing and building

the low benches used to display Japanese iris at shows, first used in Tidewater and then elsewhere in the region. And who can ever forget "the Cookie Man" during the 1991 convention!

Rich threw himself whole heartedly into any project that he undertook, be it hang gliding, woodworking, bow hunting, or recruiting irisarians. He had little use for red tape and believed in plain speaking. While this occasionally upset people, you always knew where you stood with Rich.

During the past year, Rich fought his disease in typical Rich fashion—head on. He allowed the use of experimental drugs which, while they could not save his life, may provide the information needed to save others with the same disease. What a legacy! And let us not forget that Caryll shared this fight every step of the way, watching helplessly as the cancer took its toll. Our thoughts and prayers are with her as well as with Rich's two sons, his mother and his sister.

Many suggestions will be made for ways to honor Rich. During our January visit, he expressed great concern that 145 people had elected not to renew AIS membership for 1998. I think the most fitting tribute that Region 4 could make to this energetic and dedicated man would be the renewal of those 145 lapsed memberships! These renewals can be solicited through local clubs and should be sent directly to Marilyn Harlow, AIS Membership Secretary. It is the wish of the family that any monetary gifts be sent to the AIS Memorial Fund. Any group or individual who wishes to honor Rich may send a gift to AIS in care of AIS Secretary Jeanne Clay Plank.

Over the years, Rich would drop by on his way to or from his cabin in Appomattox. His last visit was on a Sunday morning just a few weeks before his death. As always we shared big mugs of tea while we exchanged news and views. He was an easy guest, often taking part in whatever task we had going. During one visit in 1993, right after the August tornado laid down a yard full of our big trees, Rich cranked up his chain saw and joined Mike for an afternoon of cutting a path through the debris. We will miss his visits.

Rich knew how ill he was. He hoped that his membership position would be filled as soon as possible, and we discussed several possible successors when he was here. Caryll has agreed to take the job on a temporary basis. This would have pleased Rich and I am delighted that she is willing to assume this responsibility. I hope she will be able to make it a permanent appointment.

Rich's death leaves a gap in our lives. However, we will remember him as a good man, an energetic irisarian and a steadfast friend.

# B.J. and Frances Brown 1913-1997 1914-1997

Last summer Barbara Alexander, Ruth Holbrook and I visited B.J. and Frances Brown at their home in South Carolina. During our visit both B.J. and Frances signed our applications for becoming an apprentice judge. As we left that afternoon, Frances warned us to be especially careful as we entered the highway from the road where we lived. You can imagine the shock and anguish we experienced when we received a call August 7<sup>th</sup> telling us that B.J. and Frances had been killed in an automobile accident at that very intersection. While we lost two dear and loving friends, the iris community at-large lost two distinguished contributors.

Without the support of both B.J. and Frances it is conceded that the Charlotte Iris Society (CIS) would have folded years ago. B.J. served as president from 1965-67 and again from 1979-81; Frances served from 1983-85. In addition both were active Master Judges. Each in their own way, encouraged others to grow and to exhibit their best, but more importantly to be their best.

B.J. served as Regional Vice President (RVP) for Region 4 from 1984-86. As CIS members attend Regionals, we hear stories from all parts of the region about the joy and pleasure of having worked with B.J.

Frances was an excellent photographer and had served as photographer for Region 4 when B.J. was RVP. Both were at home in the kitchen and we always looked forward to B.J.'s cornbread and Frances' pound cake at our covered dish luncheons.

B.J. was a talented hybridizer of irises and daylilies. His iris introductions include: BLUE ETCHINGS '73, DESIGNER CHOICE '83, CATAWBA FRILLS '90, CATAWBA HONEY '90, CATAWBA MAIDEN '90, CATAWBA PEACH '90, CATAWBA QUEEN '90, CATAWBA WARRIOR '90, ELEANOR YATES '93, CATAWBA CAMOUFLAGE '93, CATAWBA POTTERY '93 and OUEEN CHARLOTTE '93.

About the time that B.J. and Frances planned to move just over the North Carolina line into South Carolina, the CIS made them honorary members so that we would not lose them despite their moving into Region 5.

When they moved, they shared many of their iris and daylilies with their CIS friends, always the generous ones.

Perhaps Clarence Mahan in a letter to Katharine Steele says it for all of us when he wrote - "...if there is a paradise, B.J. and Frances will be there....B.J. and Frances loved people and were much loved in return. We shall miss them terribly."

Thank you B.J. and Frances for the love and kindness you shared with everyone.

# MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING Region Four American Iris Society Lewisburg, West Virginia Saturday, October 4, 1997

RVP Anne Lowe called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. With minor changes the agenda was approved. Minutes of the May 10, 1997 Board meeting were corrected as follows: Parliamentarian Rosalie Figge is serving as Corresponding Secretary for the Maryland Parliamentary Association and will attend the National Meeting of Parliamentarians in September, 1997. Minutes then approved as published in August Newscast.

### **Officer Reports**

#### **RVP** - Anne Lowe

At the AIS Board Meeting in Dearborn, the Bylaws passed with only minor revisions and were included with the July Bulletin for general vote. Results will be reported at the Fall Board Meeting in Austin; approval means that the Term Limits Policy for AIS Directors will be in force.

In the past, AIS has awarded the Past RVP Pin to each retiring RVP. The RVP's feel that each region should decide whether on not its retiring RVP has earned that award and that AIS should no longer be involved. Each region will purchase its own pin. Our bylaws state that the regional treasurer will be custodian of this pin, so we need make no changes in our policy.

During 1998 our region will have 4 votes on the AIS Board; Clarence Mahan, 1st V-P; Mike Lowe, Director; Roy Epperson, Director Elect and I am the one year RVP Representative/Director.

The 1998 Symposium results were interesting but predictable. Although the Bulletin was not received in parts of the region until after August 15th, 87 ballots were returned—2 more than in 1997. While these were mostly from the 'faithful few', I was pleased to note some new names among the voters. Voting percentage was 12.8 which is down from last year, because results were based on 682 eligible voters; in 1996, figures were based on 596 members. Thanks to all of you who helped get out the vote.

The results of our voting made three things obvious: (1) the tried and true varieties get the votes; (2) regional introductions get the

votes—Immortality tied with Dusky Challenger for the Number 1 position; (3) newer and untried varieties do not get a significant number of votes in Region 4.

Region 4 membership is at an all time high! In May we had 637 members with 53 deleted in the March drop; currently we have 710 members with 28 possible drops in September. This is an increase of nearly 50 new irisarians and I expect the total to be even higher on the next printout. Congratulations and thanks to you all for your successful recruiting efforts. Keep up the good work! Special thanks to Regional Membership Chairman Rich Randall for his untiring support in securing and keeping members for Region 4.

Today we must reconsider our bid to host the 2003 National Convention. In August I sent 150 letters throughout the region in order to give as many members as possible a chance to express an opinion. The input has been great and will be considered as we make a final decision regarding this matter.

I have the video of the 1996 bloom in the Loomis Test Garden. I am turning it over to the Secretary. Contact her if you want to view it.

Special thanks go to the ENC group for their \$500 donation to be used to defray the publication costs of the Culture issue of Newscast. This is a down-the-line project which has already been approved by the Region 4 Board and for which funds have already been budgeted. I encourage other chapters to follow the lead of ENC in supporting this worthy endeavor.

I plan to attend the Fall AIS Board Meeting in Austin, TX.

Roy Epperson moved, Carol Warner seconded that Region 4 donate \$100.00 in honor of Rich Randall, our outstanding Membership Chairman, to the AIS unrestricted fund. The motion carried. The Eastern North Carolina Iris Society made a contribution of \$500.00 to the region for the preparation and publication of the culture issue of Newscast.

# Acting Asst. RVP - Libby Dufresne

We must thank Eastern North Carolina for hosting the Spring '97 meeting and for Alleghany Highlands for this meeting in the Fall '97. Eastern N. C. has hosted two Spring Regionals within 5 years and have volunteered for the Fall meeting in 2000; and Alleghany Highlands has hosted two Fall Regionals within 2 years!

What an example both of these groups have set for all of us! I have been able to add three more regional meetings to our schedule since Spring '97 but we are still not current since we should schedule three years in advance.

The following meetings have been scheduled for coming years:

Spring 98 - FSK Spring 2000 - Tidewater Fall 98 - Charlotte Fall 2000 - Eastern N. C Spring 99 - C&P Spring 2001 - Open Spring 2002 - PCSIS

You may notice in the above list that no chapter has volunteered to host the Spring 2001 Regional meeting. This is a disappointment to me and may also be to all of you if no meeting is held. These Regional meetings are important, not only to see other iris gardens or to see iris on the show bench, but also for the opportunity to participate in Judges Training. This is very valuable information you need whether you expect to become a judge or not and the Regional meeting is the place to get it.

At the present time we have 13 Affliates in Region 4. If each Affiliate took a regular turn hosting their turn would one come up once every 6 ½ years. Surely we can manage that! We need, immediately, host for Spring 2001 - this is to give the Affiliate time to appoint Chairmen and to request guest iris for the gardens. ## Beardless and Species - Carol Warner

1997 has been a less than perfect year for beardless irises. There were no section conventions and the lateness of the bloom season in Michigan made it almost impossible to see siberians in bloom. A Japanese Iris Symposium at the Royal Botanical Gardens in Ontario promises to be very enjoyable.

Locally, siberians especially struggled through the unpredictable winter weave, and then suffered in an extended drought. The bloom on established clumps was irregular and spotty. For the first time in my experience growing beardless, I had extensive plant loss. Plants have been under such stress that the foliage on established clumps is sprawled on the ground and the wonderful landscape quality of beardless is compromised.

The joy of gardening is the promise of a better season next year.

# Median Irises - Dick Sparling

Pretty poor year, Median wise and of course it was all weather related but wait until next year. If this years growth is any indication watch out. Even some of my MTBs, which have taken a beating for two years, are showing some rebound. But it takes a reasonable winter and spring to have a good bloom. Cross your fingers.

I had some excellent clumps of small Arilbreds and as a matter of fact the best clump of the whole year was ARIL REVERIE. Just a great show. Which brings me to do a little pushing of the Aril class. In spite of what you have heard Arilbreds do quite well in this area. These are a combination of Arils and some other form of bearded iris down to 1/8 Aril or three generations of cutting the pure Aril strain. While few Arils grow well here because of the excess water and humidity, the Arilbreds can put up with this Eastern climate. Much work with them has been done by Fred Gadd up in New England. Carl Boswell has done well in the class from the Bay Area of California as has Hooker Nichols in the Midwest. The basic background of Arils is Middle Eastern where they have a hot dry climate. But the introduction of regular bearded iris of European or North American background which have a wetter climate has done wonders for the Arils here in this area. It might behoove you to try a few. The sizes range from 4" to 40" or more. The Aril Society has no separate height classification but generally splits them at 28". One must look carefully to find the height and if not in the catalog one must go to the Registration and Classification books.

I have a good deal of trouble with those Arilbreds with 3/4 Aril. I found that the Arils are able to take as much water as the other iris get and thrive. So try a few. You might like them.

There is now a National Median Robin going. Bennett Jones is the Director. A Dwarf Robin has started as well. Get in touch with John Taylor, Editor of the DIS Newsletter or me.

Dr. Epperson moved that the agenda for this meeting be modified to reflect that reports of the Region Four affiliates were submitted in written form only in the interest of saving time. The reports will appear in their entirety in the next Newscast. Motion was seconded and passed.

#### Unfinished Business

Motion to approve the change of our name to AIS Region Four, Inc. was made, seconded, and passed. This will be changed in our By-laws to finalize the incorporation process. Bill Kuykendall, our attorney of record, will be added to the standing committee list.

Roy Epperson, Dennis Stoneburner, and Rosalie Figge will complete the Region Four Operations Manual including policies, procedures, and updated By-laws.

Clarence Mahan moved, Rosalie Figge seconded the use of an engraved Jefferson cup for the B. Y. Morrison Award. Motion carried. It was clarified that this is a regional award.

If anyone has information on iris culture, send it to Dennis Stoneburner. This information will be compiled for the special issue of Newscast on regional iris culture.

The approved Regional Logo is available in a size suitable for stationery. There are no funds available from the Region for providing stationery, but anyone may use the logo and provide the stationary for affiliate use.

#### **New Business**

RVP Lowe asked for approval of Lloyd Zurbrigg as Reblooming Iris Chairman. Motion was made, seconded and passed.

The RVP asked for approval to delete the Publicity/Public Relations Committee. This function is being carried out at the local society level. Motion was made, seconded and passed.

It was moved, seconded and passed to amend Section 3, Article 7 of the Region Four By-laws to say "standing committees may be created and deleted as needed." RVP Lowe suggested that the Budget Committee name be changed to Ways and Means. Motion was made, seconded and carried. Final vote on the By-laws changes will take place at the Spring '98 meeting.

After discussion a motion was made and seconded to authorize the RVP to relay to the AIS Board our request that the AIS Calendars for 1998 be available for purchase by May 1, 1998. Motion was passed.

Much concern was expressed over the performance of the current AIS Exhibition Chairman. Several societies had problems receiving show schedule approval and ribbons in a timely manner. The RVP will address this issue in a letter to AIS President Dave Niswonger.

Dennis Stoneburner moved, Roy Epperson seconded that the RVP by given \$200 toward expenses for the Fall AIS Board Meeting. Motion passed.

The following were elected to the Nominating Committee: Roy Epperson - NC, Carol Warner - MD, Clarence Mahan - VA, Margaret Stone - WVA, Libby Dufresne - DC. RVP Lowe appointed Clarence Mahan Chairman of the Committee.

After much discussion and offers of assistance from many members a popular vote showed clear support for Region 4 to host the 2003 AIS National Convention. The Board then voted to reaffirm the invitation. Clarence Mahan will serve as Chairman and Roy Epperson will serve as reserve/backup Chairman.

An invitation from FSK was extended for the 1998 Spring meeting in Towson, MD on May 22 and 23.

The meeting was suspended at 12:50 p.m. until 7:00 and is being presented now for your (dis) approval. It is recommended that:

1) A Memorial Fund should be instituted and used in memory of those individuals who have provided outstanding service to the Region. 2) A line item in the budget can be drawn from as needed. 3) It is suggested that memorials should not exceed \$100.00 per individual and be sent to the appropriate area of interest on the national level or a worthy project within Region 4's jurisdiction. Recommendations will be made by the Memorial Committee, which is comprised of three (3) appointed members.

NOTE: There have been three deaths this summer. Dr. D. C. Nearpass and Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Brown, all of whom contributed in many different ways to the Region.

This ends our report. Thank you.

# 1997 Fall Show - Lewisburg WV

# Barry Francis Blyth

arry Blyth was born and raised in Melbourne, Australia, and received his Diploma of Horticulture from Burnley Horticultural College. In 1961 he went to England and spent two years working in nurseries there (John Waterer Son & Crisp, and Hilliers at Winchester). He returned to Australia and went into partnership with his parents growing irises. lupines and dahlias. (His family also had a perennial and alpine nursery in England, Prichards at Mudeford in Christchurch, where they grew many irises. particularly siberians. It closed in 1966.) His maternal grandfather, Russell Prichard, came to Australia prior to World War I and began an alpine and perennial nursery. His parents began their own nursery in 1939, so Barry is the fourth generation in the nursery business.

He married Lesley, whom he met in England in 1965, and they have three children. Pan, Timothy and Heidi. Upon his parent's retirement, he and Lesley continued the iris business, calling it Tempo Two. They moved to their present location eleven years ago. He and Lesley are divorced, but are still business partners and good friends, and make their full time living from growing and selling irises.

Barry began crossing irises as a child of seven or eight, and started his present intensive breeding program in 1963 on his return from England. His main goal was to raise a pink amoena, and over thirty years it has not appeared. He cannot complain though, with all the lovely colors and combinations that have appeared in his search for the elusive Pink Amoena. On the average, he flowers five thousand seedlings per year. though some years it has gone to fifteen thousand. This usually consists of a thousand Dwarfs and Medians and the rest TBs, with a few hundred Spurias every other year. Their family would have registered over four hundred varieties of irises over the past forty years. All of their children have made many iris crosses. Lesley also makes a few crosses most years. though she is more interested in the Hosta collection they are getting together.

Barry is probably the most well-known of our "International". hybridizers to AIS members. He has been sending his irises to AIS conventions since the early seventies, and his CABARET ROYALE garnered a lot of attention at the 1977 convention in Memphis. In 1986 he was awarded the Australian Dykes Medal for his tall bearded SOSTENIQUE. He has also won a number of international awards, at the Vienna median competition, the Munich IGA and at Florence he has gotten various awards, as high as the Silver Medal (second

place). From the AIS he has won Awards of Merit for his TBs GALLANT ROGUE and TOMORROW'S CHILD and HMs for IN TOWN and WITCH'S WAND.

The three Blyth children have taken over the wholesale side of the business, purchasing ten acres next door to Tempo Two, and they are called Tempo Three. So the fifth generation carries on.

# Unique features for Iris Shows

While iris shows are always wonderful, presenting a rainbow of color across the tables, the Charlotte Iris Society (CIS) has incorporated a feature into the show that assures even more color. We add a Section B under Tall Bearded designated as Tall Bearded Single Bloom with no stalk. The section is to encourage the inclusion of blooms especially new introductions, when the grower may not wish to cut the whole stalk. The practice means that often blooms will be included in the section that would not otherwise be seen in the show. The uniformity of height of the blooms does indeed create a glorious tapestry of color. Ribbons are given for each cultivar as in other sections, but the winner of Best of Section is not eligible for consideration of Best in Show. No one seems to remember when the section was added to the show schedule, but it is always a popular section.

Another feature of the CIS show is to provide a crystal vase or piece of similar value to each Section winner, with a more substantial piece presented to the Best in Show winner. We also have a traveling award (silver wine cooler) which is engraved with Best of Show cultivar and grower's name each year. The crystal awards are generally purchased with contributions from members given in memory of or in honor of special friends. Ribbons are nice, but our chow entrants seem to enjoy the opportunity to win crystal as well. Our budget for crystal awards is \$10.00 per award and by watching for special sales throughout the year we can provide attractive pieces of crystal for awards. Cards are included with each award identifying the donor and the person honored or remembered by the award. In addition, one of our members provides a crystal platter to the winner of Best in Design.

Each of these features seem to add a special quality to our show that our participants appreciate.

# RICHARD RANDALL IRIS LOVER. IRIS FRIEND TO EVERYONE

Rich Randall had a love affair with the flower iris from the first moment he laid eyes on the flower. Rich was a sailor on leave in a foreign land. And like most sailors was seeing the sights, when he came, by accident, upon a flower that would change the focus of his free time for the rest of his life. It was Florence, Italy in the late 70's. The rainbow of colors, the beauty of the flower, everything about Iris was enchanting to Rich. For a boy from the Bronx the Iris was a sight to behold.

Rich was a 24 year navy man. He retired in 1986 as a Senior Chief Petty Officer. As soon as he was on shore duty he started growing and learning more about the exquisite flower he had seen in Florence. Somehow, he managed to attend a couple of spring regional conventions and got completely hooked not only on Iris but on the Society. By the time he had retired he was growing tall bearded beauties.

Early in 1986 Rich had a meeting at his home with people mostly from Williamsburg and they founded the Tidewater Iris Society. (It is my understanding that a number of years prior to this there had been a very active society in the area.) Most of the original members of TIS lived in Williamsburg and that was where they held most of their meetings. As the year progressed more and more people from the Virginia Beach/Norfolk area joined TIS. The following year TIS and Williamsburg became two separate societies. Rich was the first President of the original chapter and then became the first President of the present Tidewater chapter.

Rich believed in the Regional and National Society. He along with his wife Caryll became AIS judges & Lifetime Member of AIS as well as members of the other sections. Rich held the regional post of membership chairman for a number of years. He was committed to membership and kept everyone updated and on their toes when it came to membership. Rich was also involved in changing our Membership Contest to the present system which he believed to be fairer for all chapters. One of his final wishes was that the members who had not joined AIS in 1998 would renew their membership.

Shortly, after starting to grow TB's, because of Caryll, Rich became interested in Siberian Iris. Then his true love came into his love—

Japanese Iris. He joined SJI and went to every National SJI convention after becoming a member. Rich loved to visit gardens and each year would make a long trip to visit Japanese gardens, one year to New England, the next year to the mid-west, then to eastern gardens and on and on. Rich was the SJI display garden chairman and loved every minute of it

Interestingly enough even though Japanese Irises were his true love, Louisiana Iris grew the best for Rich. He attended a Louisiana Convention and found a new place in his heart for them. Spurias were a challenge to him. Rich really enjoyed Spuria Iris but never was successful in growing them.

Rich started the Portsmouth, Chesapeake & Suffolk Iris Society. Again he was their first president. He also founded the Central Virginia Chapter. Rich felt that one of the most important things all chapters should do, was to hold shows or at least expos' every year so the public would be exposed to all types of irises. To the end he was active in both local societies and made it a point to enter iris in all shows. The last show he entered was the TIS 1997 Japanese Show.

Thanks to Rich TIS has put on a Japanese show for the past several years. He built black Japanese tables to display the iris on so that they would be low enough for the public to see the beauty of the tall Japanese Iris. Rich was known for his woodworking skills and not only made the Japanese tables, but also the wooden containers we use to display our iris in the shows. For the National Convention held in Washington D.C. in 1991 he made the containers for the center pieces for all the tables at the banquet. Rich also made wooden trivets which were given to all the people who attended the convention. Rich was known in Region 4 as the "Cookie Monster" (inside joke, you needed to in Region 4 in 1991 to understand) during the National Convention.

Rich was always willing to come to see your garden, talk to you about iris, give a speech to any group and/or invite you to his garden. Every year he sent written invitations to the garden clubs in the area to come and visit his iris. Rich judged and spoke both here in Region 4 as well as outside the Region. His devotion to AIS and SJI are well known to everyone who has had the privilege of knowing him. When he went to Germany a few years back to visit family, he & Caryll made a side trip to Belgium where he visited a pen pal who he had known from the Iris Society and has kept in contact with for years.

Rich was completely sold on the value of Iris Societies, local, regional and national. The only regional he ever missed after becoming a member was last spring (1997 at High Point, NC) when he was coming out of the first of his many trips to the hospital for Chemo treatments. If he could have gone he would have been there. He also missed the National that year in Deerborn, MI which was a first, after attending for many years. Many national iris lovers were concerned by his absence and missed him.

The illness that finally took Rich from us began a year ago in February. After numerous tests, in May it was discovered that he had the big "C" cancer, it had widely spread throughout his body. From that point on until Feb 14<sup>th</sup> of this year it has been a fight every day. Hospital visits, hospital stays, doctor visits, more and different specialist, tried and true methods, experimental methods and on and on it went. Some days he didn't look or feel so good, but at the end he looked like Rich and acted like Rich. After missing the Spring Convention Rich looked forward to the Fall Convention in West Virginia and was thrilled that he was able to attend it and see so many old and good friends.

Rich entered the hospital on Thursday, Feb 12<sup>th</sup>, went into a coma on Friday and pasted away Saturday at 3 a.m. the way that he would have wanted to go if he could have had his say. As was his wish he was cremated and his ashes were scattered at his cabin in Western Virginia.

The Iris Society lost a true friend with the passing of Rich. A person who devoted a great deal of time and effort to the growing and publicizing the cultivar IRIS. He introduced a great number of people to the beauty of iris. Rich was continually encouraging people to join the society and to enjoy growing iris. He will be missed not only in Tidewater, Va or in Region 4, but through the Iris Community.

Rich leaves behind his wife Caryll, who has served as Region 4 Secretary and was just re-elected Region 4 Secretary last fall. Caryll will remain in the area. He had two sons who live in Vermont, two stepdaughters and a stepson all married who live in Virginia Beach and three grandchildren. His mother and sister lives in Long Island. There will be a memorial mass for Rich in Long Island at a date to be announced later. Memorial donations may be made to AIS.

A personal note to Rich. We didn't always agree with you and we let you know it as you did with us. We always knew what you thought. Thanks for all the help, advice and most of all the encouragement you gave not only to us but to everyone who had an interest in Iris. You will be missed and never forgotten. When we see the beauty of the Iris, no matter the season, you will be remembered.

The organizational year for the Charlotte Iris Society (CIS) begins after our Spring Iris Show, which means that we start immediately planning for our summer rhizome sale. Thanks to a collection of rebloomers from Don and Ginny Spoon (given in honor of Don's mother, Lilla Spoon), iris from our members, including a very large number of rhizomes grown by Dave Hull in his neighbors garden, plus a group of recent introductions from Stockton Gardens, we netted approximately \$1,640.00.

The September meeting which launched our traditional Golden Anniversary year featured our traditional plant auction with a new twist....first we added a fixed price sale for multiples of perennials, but more importantly after 45 years of Tuesday covered dish luncheons we moved our meetings to Saturday mornings. Our attendance and profits from the auction increased almost threefold. The auction featured Japanese Iris from Draycott Gardens and a collection of rhizomes with emphasis on rebloomers from Pat and Randall Bowen, plus other perennials from our members.

November provided us with a preview of a new slide program on "The World of Iris" by Katharine Steele. Several garden clubs have requested the program plus the prestigious Charlotte Garden Club.

Our popular February Seminar will feature two sessions - the first one "Getting Started with Iris" by Ruth Holbrook and Dave Hull. Following this we will have a professionally produced video of Walter Hoover's garden in Saluda, N.C. and finally Walter will present a session on Japanese Iris that may be used for one hour of Judges Training. ## **SLUGS--CONTROL**

There are several management/control options for slugs. First and foremost is to remove their habitat. Avoid debris left in the garden that provides a hiding place. Encourage air movement. Using less mulch may not seem practical but will reduce the slug population. Some plants may be mulched that don't need mulching; a mature hosta plant will shade the ground and limit any weed competition.

Some plants may appear less desirable to slugs. While many hostas seem to attract slugs like a magnet, many of the blue types and/or those with "waffled" leaves seem unaffected. Succulents, ivy, and ripening produce are also attractive food sources.

Certain mulch material tends to be less attractive to slugs. Cedar chips, pine needles and rinsed, crushed egg shells tend to repel slugs, either due to odor, resin and/or sharp edges. In fact, many hosta growers are reporting remarkable successes with pine needles applied two to three inches thick. Needles will not significantly disturb the soil pH.

Hand picking slugs and crushing them (or placing them in a jar or bag for disposal if you're squeamish) is another alternative, especially during the evening and early morning hours. Slugs can be trapped under boards or overturned flower pots and removed. Keep the traps in the garden several days before removing to allow slug populations to discover a new "hiding place."
